

DID YOU KNOW? Our school taxes are lower or comparable to most of our neighbors.


Total School Property Taxes On a \$175,000 home


The tax impact for the referendum is less than the cost of a large pizza each month.

DO YOU OWN AGRICULTURAL LAND? A 70% TAX CREDIT IS HERE FOR YOU!

If you own agricultural land, the State of Minnesota will pay for a large portion of the total referendum project through the Ag2School Tax Credit program. This is an automatic reduction of property taxes paid - you don't need to take any action! The legislature passed this legislation in the 2017 session and it remains today.

REFERENDUM FUNDING SOURCES

A high percentage of the referendum will be paid for by commercial/industrial businesses, especially Enbridge. Residential property owners in the district will pay approximately 15% (\$5.2 million) of the cost of the referendum. Referendum funding sources are in the chart below.



WHY IS A GYMNASIUM NEEDED?

First and foremost, gyms are physical education classrooms, with classes required by the Minnesota Department of Education. Ours are too small - large numbers of elementary students at a time use the space and can't do many of the activities due to the small size. Meanwhile, when elementary school recess is held indoors, the only space for students is in the gym, canceling physical education classes during recess times, and there's very little spectator space for junior high competition.

Students and families in the Clearbrook-Gonvick school district thrive in their "new" school building -- built just 22 years ago -- surrounded by a sea of green space used by many outdoor activities. However, a lot has changed since it opened in 2003. Facebook had just launched to college students, most people still had flip phones, and classrooms were lined with desks in rows and students learned from books and paper worksheets.

What's new in our schools? We need more space for career and technical education, special education, and individualized learning, and increased security to guard against threats from outside the building.

The future success of our school building requires that we provide different learning spaces for students, in addition to managing long-term maintenance issues for a 22 year-old building. The Deep Roots-Building Futures referendum aims to address these challenges.

THE NEED

Our school building has reached a critical point where systems are failing. The lack of sufficient classroom and specialized learning spaces is forcing compromises that hurt our students' educational experience.

SAFETY **CLASSROOMS** SYSTEMS

Security gaps - the community steering committee strongly advocated for strengthening safety and school security

Fitness center - too many students in too small a space - they spill out into the hallway and nearby gym, damaging flooring in the process

The Cafeteria - Commons serves as the only hallway between wings, and congestion is a challenge during passing times during our twohour lunch period

Physical education classes include large numbers of students, resulting in safety issues due to lack of space for activities

High demand for career and technical education with insufficient classroom space

Teaching in storage areas and hallways; Elementary classrooms are too small

Lack of adequate special education spaces and small group settings

No space for spectators viewing junior high sports

Indoor recess creates gym scheduling conflicts with physical education classes

Outdated and inadequate locker room space

Inadequate storage space leads to storage in common areas obstructing pathways

Roof is failing - roof is out of warranty, leaking, and beyond patching

Water damage - penetration at building base is causing foundation settlement

Age and high traffic has resulted in significant wear and tear on doors, walls, floors, bathrooms and ceiling tiles

Doors close automatically in an emergency, but many don't latch due to warping

Fluorescent lighting throughout the building is old and inefficient. Fluorescent bulbs will not be available in Minnesota after Jan. 1, 2026

THE PLAN - A One-Question Bond Referendum on Nov. 4, 2025

If approved, this plan will include:

- Additional classrooms for career and technical education, special education, elementary, small group
- Physical education space to solve scheduling conflicts, indoor recess space, adequate space for elementary students
- · New secure entrance our goal is an even safer school for our students, staff and visitors
- · New roof, tuckpointing, seal the building envelope
- · Renovated common areas, restrooms, new LED light fixtures

This \$34.9 million referendum costs more than the last request due to inflation and project updates.
